

The History of No Man's Land

The Louisiana Purchase instantly doubled the size of the young United States, and it secured the valuable Mississippi Valley making modern America possible. In the northern parts of the purchase, Lewis and Clark established the limitations of the Purchase, but south of the Red River the lines and the intent of the sale were murky in territories that had been lightly colonized for at least three generations. Most of southwest Louisiana was simply not part of the Louisiana Purchase. And while waiting for the diplomats to draw the western boundary of America's new purchase, the commandants of the



responsible federal and Spanish garrisons closest to the area in question made a simple gentleman's agreement about the disputed territory. In a practical sense, they agreed to leave the land alone and unclaimed. They agreed to not send in militia, customs officers, or regulators of any sort. Any inhabitants would be unprotected, ungoverned, and untaxed. The commanding officer at the American fort near Natchitoches, Louisiana, and his counterpart in Nacogdoches, then capital of Spanish Texas, crafted the first "no man's land." They agreed to not legally claim a swathe of land between them to the Gulf of Mexico, at least for the time being, until the diplomats drew their final lines. This wedge of "No-Man's Land" was the status quo for nearly thirty years. The era of "No Man's Land" officially ended only when the US physically installed a military presence "Cantonment Atkinson" in 1829.
